

MOURNED FOR DEAD WIFE

Calvin B. Hawley Suicided by Shooting

THROUGH HIS TEMPLE

Had Contemplated Deed at Times Previously, He Said

in a Note Which He Left for His Children--Funeral Will Be Held This Morning.

Calvin Bateman Hawley, better known as "C. B." or "Bate," of Portage, Sunday evening suicided by shooting himself through the head. The act was probably committed about 5 o'clock at his home and was deliberately carried out.

Since the death of his wife a little more than a year ago, Mr. Hawley had been living alone; but has been taking his meals at the home of his son Charles, who lived near by. As Mr. Hawley failed to come to supper Sunday evening as usual Mrs. Hawley, his son's wife, stepped to his house to learn the reason and found him lying on the floor in a pool of blood, in the dining room in front of a mirror.

Everything was in order in the house. On a stand where Mr. Hawley had evidently been reading, was a note which he had written asking his children to forgive him for the act, but stating that he had been a sufferer from chronic dyspepsia for 20 years and since his wife died a year ago he had been most despondent. He could not stand life any longer. The note closed with directions as to some of his business matters.

Sheriff Shipman was notified and with Coroner Verhage went to the house and impanelled a coroner's jury composed of Albert W. Smith, Peter Prosius, Henry Buckland, J. F. Newell, Daniel Curry and Frank Bacon. The jury met Monday at the court house and rendered a verdict that Mr. Hawley came to his death by his own hand.

KALAMAZOO CHILD STOLEN

Little Frank Colton Kidnaped at St Joseph, Mich.

MAN FROM SAGINAW

Arrested and Has Been Identified by Young Colton.

Captor Knocked Down and the Little Fellow Rescued--Family Formerly Resided in This City.

A story comes from St. Joseph, Michigan, relative to what is said to be the boldest attempt to kidnap a the history of that city, just before dark Saturday night.

Frank Colton, seven-year-old son of Frank A. Colton, for a long time until a few years ago a resident of Kalamazoo, and a former employe of the Adams Express company, now yardmaster for the Pere Marquette in St. Joseph, was playing on the docks at the foot of Water street. A well dressed stranger approached the child, asking him to accompany him down Water street, near the lumber yards.

The boy refused to go, so the man grabbed him by the coat collar and began running east in Water street. When a block from the dock, the child began to scream, and attracted the attention of several citizens, who gave chase.

Frank Hammond sprang from an express wagon and struck the man to the ground. An instant later C. VanRipper grabbed the child from the abductor, who was driven from the street into the lumber yard. Robert Jackson of Saginaw, Mich., who was arrested Sunday morning, has been identified by young Colton.

The pistol used was one he found a little more than a year ago while driving down the West street hill coming to the city. He stated in the note that he had at times previously contemplated suicide.

Mr. Hawley was highly esteemed. Since the death of his wife he has continually grieved for her and it is believed this was the principal cause of the melancholia which caused him to take his life.

Mr. Hawley was born in Claindon, Orleans county, New York, December 24, 1827, and was married there to Miss Sarah Glidden in the fall of 1849. About 45 years ago they removed to Comstock in this county, where they lived for 21 years, when they removed to Kalamazoo, he being engaged as a windmill salesman for six years. They then removed to Portage, where they since lived.

Five sons survive their father: Edgar D., Francis M., Willis D., and Ellis J., all of this city, and Charles B. Hawley of Portage. The deceased had throughout his life been a consistent member of the M. E. church.

The funeral will be held from the home today at 10 o'clock, Rev. E. J. Bradner officiating. The burial will be at Riverside.

FORMER KALAMAZOO WOMAN

Re-elected President of Wisconsin Woman's Suffrage Association

Rev. Olympia Brown, formerly of Kalamazoo, niece of Isaac A. Brown of this city, and sister of Honorable Arthur Brown of Salt Lake City, formerly of Kalamazoo, was re-elected president of the Wisconsin Woman's Suffrage association at Racine, Wisconsin, Saturday.

Rev. Olympia Brown was born in Schoolcraft, Michigan, and is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Asa Brown. With her parents she moved in early life to Kalamazoo and lived in this city many years. Her education was gained in the Schoolcraft public schools, Mount Holyoke seminary, South Hadley, Massachusetts, Antioch college and St. Lawrence university. She was a graduate of the latter two institutions and in 1863 was ordained to the ministry of the Universalist church. After preaching for five years in Massachusetts she was called to the Universalist church in Racine, Wisconsin, where she has been since. She was editor for many years of the Racine Times. She was an active promoter of the New England Suffrage association, the first organization of its kind in the United States, and in 1882 organized the Wisconsin association, of which she has been president for a number of years.
