

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



Claude L. Murphree, University of Florida and WRUF organist, has returned from Europe, where he spent the greater part of the summer studying organ in Paris under the eminent Marcel Dupre at Mendon. Mr. Murphree went as a member of the Riemenschneider a member of the Riemenschneider Tour, and on leaving Paris visited Tour, and on leaving Paris visited Switzerland, Belgium, Germany, and to the Bavarian Alps to witness the Passion Play at Obernees the Passion Play at Obernees arean.

Marcel Dupre, who has won world wide renown as an instructor, teaches on an organ built for the late Guilmant, noted organist the late Guilmant, noted organist and composer. As a member of the master-class conducted during the summer, Mr. Murphree appeared on the interpretative program presented as a distinct feature of the course, giving by request of Dupre, one of his own compositions.

For once, said Mr. Murphree in an interview yesterday, his passion of opera was satisfied, the Gainesville artist, attending twenty or more performances in the Academie Nationale de Musique et de Dance and the l'Opera-Comique. It is interesting to note that both theatres are state subsidized, thus guaranteeing a year round existance.

In the Academic Nationale de Musique, Mr. Murphree witnessed performances of Les Hugenots, Faust (with the ballet which is omitted in American productions), La Valkyrie, Thais, Romeo and Juliet, William Tell, Rigoletto, Le Chevalier de lo Rose. In Faust he heard the great basso, Marcel Journet and in Romeo and Juliet and Rigoletto, Mme. Eide Norena. coloratura, whom Mr. Murphree considers the outstanding artist of the Paris grand opera stage. All operas were given in the French.

The American soprano, Mary McCormic, who is being acclaimed by all Europe, Mr. Murphree heard in "Manon" at the l'Opera Comique. Here also he feasted on the beauty of Carmen, Lakme, Mirelle, La Boheme, Pagliacci, Cavalleria Ructicana, Werther, Louise and Madame Butterfly. 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

Headquarters for the convention were in the famous Eastman School of Music, considered by many the most lavishly equipped music school in the world, and made possible through the generosity of the late George Eastman. Here the organists had available not only the large four-manual Skinner in Kilbourn Hall, a beautiful small concert hall; but also the tremendous four-manual Austin in the Eastman Theatre, adjoining the school. An interesting feature was a concert at the former home of Mr. Eastman, now the property of the University of Rochester, where the organ, piano, and a string quartet were featured in a program of chamber music.

The convention also heard the first performance of a new cantata by a Rochester composer Dr

Claude L. Murphree, University George Henry Day, "The Shepherds and the Wise Men." This was presented with Dr. Day's own choir and the composer at the organ. Two of the convention programs were broadcast over the NBC network, through stations WHAM and WJZ.
